GIRLS' VARSITY TENNIS FINISHES SEASON FOR THE DECADES



High School Football Season Cancelled, Stirs Controversy

With high school football teams finishing up their seasons, one California high school decided to cancel the football team's season for a very odd reason. Administration from Palos Verdes Peninsula High School ended the varsity football team's season three games early due to a "large" amount of injuries on the team. "We feel like both the administration and coaches let us down," senior football player Jack Grimes said, according to ABC7. "We're not exactly sure whose idea was it in the first place, but neither one of them would fight for us. Our coach we always thought had our back, and he showed that he doesn't have our back."

Of the 27 players on the varsity team, six were injured which led the administration to cancel the season to protect their players from injury. However, they allowed the varsity players to move down to the JV level for the final two games. This caused severe controversy not only

among the players, but among parents and supporters as well.

According to ABC7, Principal Mitzi Cress said that "we no longer believe that we can safely field a varsity team without putting the health of our remaining student athletes in jeopardy.' Many seniors on the varsity team expressed disapproval for a couple reasons. They believed that playing on the JV level would be dangerous for other teams and they wanted to stand up for themselves in the controversial decision. In fact, students and players created a petition that gained nearly 2,000 signatures. Unfortunately, no changes were made for the players, leaving the football team shocked

"I think it's sad for the administration and for the school to shut down something like football because they always strive for perseverance — that's what they push at this school and for greatness — and I feel like they just cut us off and didn't give us a chance to persevere in this time," Palos Verdes football player Paxton Shive said.
