History of the L.A. County Fair

The Los Angeles County Fair is an annual festival that first took place on Oct. 17, 1922 with C.B. Afflerbaugh being its first manager. It was founded to present the pride and festivities of the citizens in LA. The fair has existed for nearly 96 years of history, even closing for a period of time due to the Great Depression in the 1930s

Around 1925, the fair received more than 100,000 visitors. Soon after, the date of the fair was settled on the month of September. Unfortunately, the Great Depression in 1931 started to affect visitation. Luckily, the 1940s swept in and allowed the LA County Fair to regroup during the Second World War.

The LA County Fair regained popularity during 1948. Attendance grew until it was a little over one million and their mascot, Thummer the fun loving pig, was introduced and is still around today. The following year, they also added 72 acres more of property. The fair's growth continued as they added more and more attractions throughout the 1950s, such as the NHRA racetrack and the Flower and Garden Pavilion.

In 2000, President George W. Bush cut the ribbon for the new entrance of the LA County Fair. The year after, the festival closed for the first time since World War Two due to the Sept. 11 terrorist attack. In the years following, they continued to expand, add more attractions and remodel.


