Former varsity girls' tennis Head Coach Bill Yee steps down from his position this year to switch roles with former JV Coach Calvin Chow. Chow explains the switch as the decision to take Yee away from the strain of being a varsity coach, as well as an AP U.S. History teacher.

However, despite having a new team under his wing, Chow was able to lead the girls through the preseason and into Almont League games with a 8-7 record. In addition, it was accomplished with only three returning varsity members from last year. Co-Captains Nancy Vong and Gabrielle Hong commend him for keeping the team strong through the transition of coaches.

"The team is really unified and we have a great bond," said Vong.

Chow is also excited for the potential of this year's team. He expects

the same discipline as his former JV players, but now the performance levels are higher. The team agrees that his attitude exemplifies just that vision.

As the team still needs to improve most on their mentality during matches, Chow combats this weak-

ness through reaction volley drills. By staging the players just behind the net, Chow is able to improve the girls' focused state by presenting a shorter reaction time frame than if they were farther away from the net. The girls acknowledge the more intensive practice as a needed preparation for facing faster opponents.

"He has [made] us more dedicated. We were not as focused last year," said Hong.

With the rest of the League season left to unfold, the team remains comfortable with their new coach, along with their current record. Chow feels the same way towards his new varsity team.

"Any player under his guidance will improve a lot because he is a good teacher," said Vong.

Football Seniors Set Stage for Almont League Success

Although the varsity football team is now on a two-game losing streak, the Moors still have a fighting chance of placing top three in the Almont League. It is up to a handful of seniors steer the relatively young Moors toward victory, with their invaluable in-field experience and mentality of leaders.

At the helm stands senior Chris Salgado, who is eminent as the chief blocker and the lead figure of the team's offensive line. A prospective member since the start, he views his role on the team as much more extensive than simply a lineman. Keeping the young members in place is a responsibility of his position, but it is one that returns support to him.

"I don't feel the pressure at all because I believe in the rest of the players to help me out when I need help," said Salgado.

With the strength of the team lying in the linemen, senior Jacob Caraballo has led the offense with 234 rushing yards, as well as provided an asset to the defensive lineup. The

premier runner averages six yards per carry as running back, and has made 51 tackles as defensive line-backer, situating him as a main force of the team. Caraballo emphasizes the pride that the position brings, but acknowledges it as a motivator to work harder for the younger players of the team as well.

James Martin is the only returning senior of the starting receivers, with 300 yards and 22 catches from seven games so far. Taking over from last year's Joseph Becerra and Mitchell Crockom, Martin's progress as the go-to receiver is a positive sign for the imminent competition the team will face in the next two weeks.

After their last two rattling losses to Schurr and Montebello, the Moors are now fighting against San Gabriel for their League reputation; their Homecoming game against the Matadors is a chance victory that they cannot afford to lose. The Alhambra community anticipates the full potential of the senior players to guide the young team into qualifying for the California Interscholastic Federation playoffs once again.
