Starting next school year, there will be changes to the AHS administration. The current Assistant Principal (AP) of Instruction, Brandon Dade, has been promoted to the position of principal in two Alhambra Unified School District high schools: Century and Independence.

"I feel I'm ready to be a principal, and [this] is the only opportunity in [the] district. It's a good fit for me and the kids there," Dade said.

Dade has been an administrator at AHS for the past five years. He accepted his new position on April 4 and will begin in the '11-'12 school year.

"[Dade] is going to make a fabulous principal and the kids at Independence and Century High will really benefit [from] him," Cisneros said. "I'm also excited about my new position, because instruction and curriculum is my specialty. But we'll all miss him terribly."

Phuong Nguyen, currently AP of Student Services, will become AP of Guidance.

"I am very excited about the opportunity but will greatly miss AHS," Dade said. "It has been home for me for eight years and it has been a pleasure working with the staff and students here."



Besides this display of musical talents, there will also be an art exhibit in the auditorium lobby featuring artists from both AHS and the Special Academy. In addition, five senior artists featured in the exhibit will be awarded schol-

arships during the show.

A minimum donation of five dollars is requested for the purchase of tickets. The money donated will be used to fund the scholarships such as the ones that will be awarded at this concert.

"[Through this concert, we hope] to increase public awareness, recognition and appreciation of the creative talents of people with disabilities by providing opportunities that encourage, promote and showcase their artistic expressions," Special Academy President and CEO Michael Dergar said.

Atlantic Edwards Theater to be Demolished

Although the Edwards Theater on Atlantic Boulevard is now known for its discount-priced movie tickets, it was once hailed as one of the first multiplexes in Los Angeles and contains a rich history that dates back over 70 years.

Despite being one of the oldest movie theaters in Alhambra, the Edwards Atlantic has been planned for demolition on July 1.

"With the newer movie theaters nearby, I don't think it

will be missed," senior Marcelo Flores said. "[But] one of my greatest memories [at] the theater is lining up with my family to watch the first Spiderman."

In 1939, James Edwards III purchased the theater on Atlantic Boulevard for \$400, adding to his ownership of several other movie theaters around Monterey Park.

As movies with audio became more and more popular, business thrived, so Edwards bought another property next door in order to expand the

theater.

This cinema on Atlantic Boulevard was then damaged by an earthquake in 1987 and Edwards rebuilt a new structure; this structure became the flagship of his theater franchise.

In 2000, three years after Edwards' death, Edwards Cinema filed for bankruptcy, and their theaters were acquired by the Regal Entertainment Group.

In 2002, when the Edwards Renaissance on Main Street was constructed, more and

more customers flocked to the modern theater and ticket sales plummeted for the Atlantic location.

After July, Alhambra's oldest movie theater will be replaced by a new government office building. The parking structure for the theater, however, will remain.

"It's a little sad that the building will be taken down, but it's very old," senior Jasmine Orozco said. "If the movie theater will be replaced with an office that provides jobs, it [may] actually [be] a good thing."

New California Vaccination Law

Beginning in the next fall of the '11-'12 school year, a new immunization law will require all California students entering seventh through twelfth grade to be immunized with a Tdap (tetanus, diphtheria and acellular pertussis) booster shot. Previously, only incoming seventh graders needed records of the shot.

Pertussis, more commonly known as whooping cough, is a highly contagious and potentially deadly respiratory disease that causes violent and uncontrollable coughing.

"One single vaccination shot

does not usually provide a person lifetime protection against the bacteria or virus," AHS Nurse Anita Man said. "A second or third dose may be needed to protect individuals for the longest time possible. A booster dose simply means a follow-up shot of vaccine."

In order to be in compliance with this new law by the next school year, Man urges AHS students to get the Tdap shot as soon as possible.

After receiving the shot, students can bring the record of it to the Health Office during school hours.

AUSD Fundraises for Japan Relief
